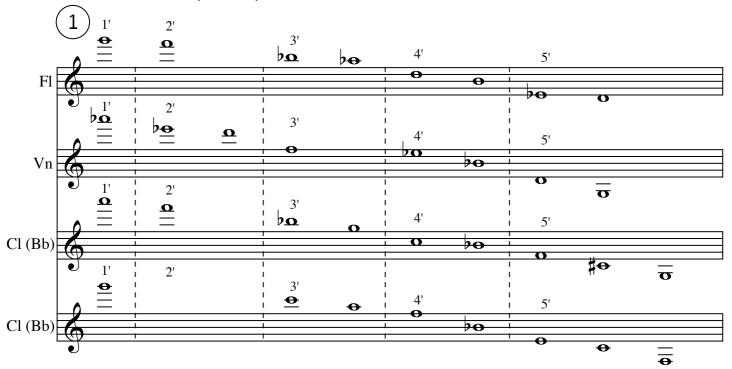
Part 1: Prepared piano, flute, violin, clarinets

Use the pitches above (adding one or two at a time, as shown) to improvise irregular, pointillistic rhythms, like rain starting to fall on a tin roof. Avoid repetition or regular pulses.

The phrases should follow a naturalistic breath cycle, for example, play for 3-5 seconds, rest for 3-5 seconds.

Each phrase should fade in and out, and have some unexpected accents.

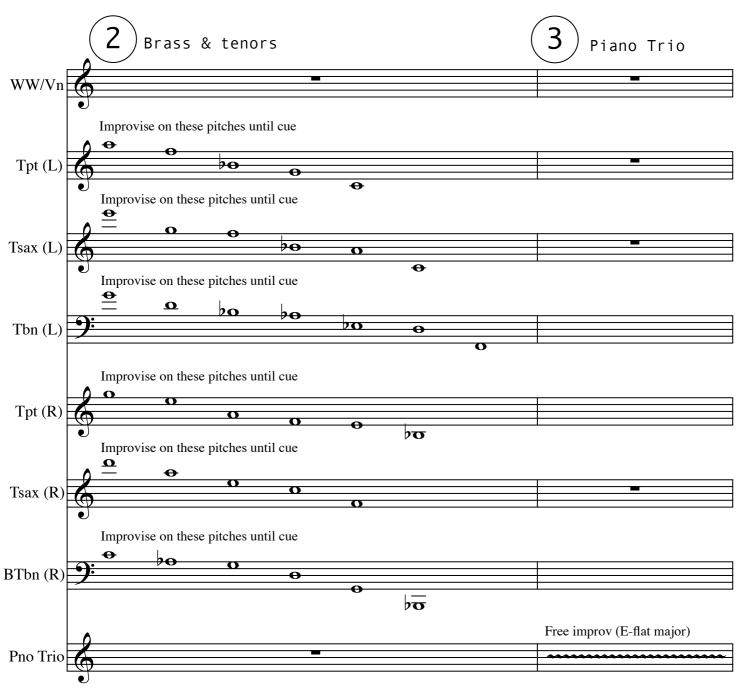
As you add more and more pitches, the phrases may become more and more elaborate.

Part 2: The whole ensemble

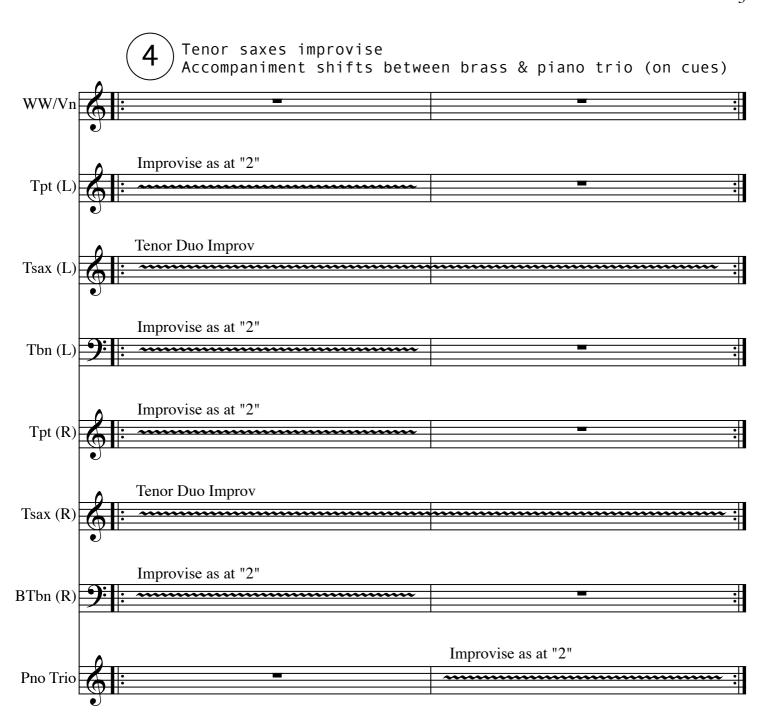


Full and rich - a wall of sound bouncing around the ensemble.

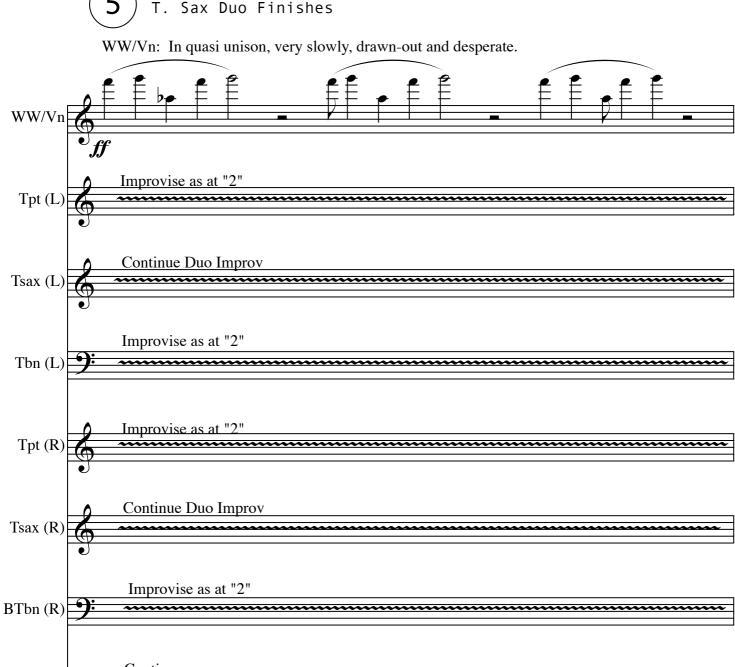
Use the pitches above to improvise irregular, pointillistic rhythms, like rain falling on a tin roof. Avoid repetition or regular pulses.

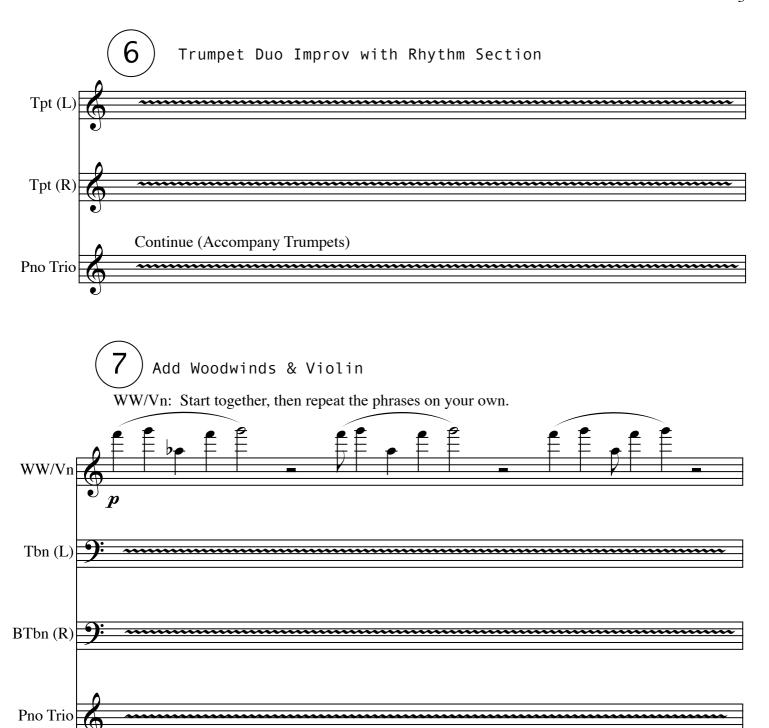

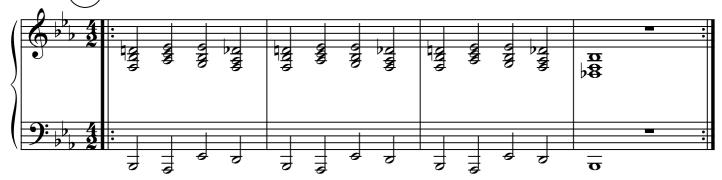






Part 3a: Piano, Bass & Trombones, WW

(11) Play freely - Churchlike and disembodied



First Piano sets up chords solo.

Then Bass solos over the chords.

Next the two Trombones join in with a quasi gospel feel.

Finally Flute & Clarinets join with subtone chords:



The chords should be held for irregular durations, out of synch with the piano. One player can lead the others through the sequence.

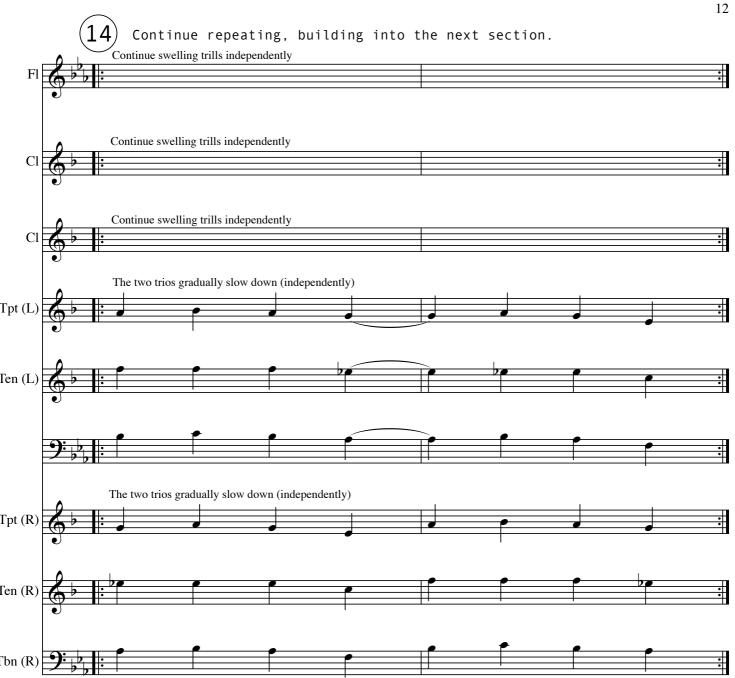
Drums enter subliminally, and bass comes into synch with the piano, setting up the groove for the next section...
